AUKUS has raised much debate in Australia and beyond. While probably Australia's most significant security pact in a century, underlying, crucial questions remain.

- Do Defence Alliances and sophisticated weaponry make us truly secure?
- What value do we put on the “good diplomacy” of trust building and strengthening of relations?
- How deft is our foreign policy towards China?
- Does our Overseas Aid serve our neighbours, or our own interests?
- What is the cost of *not* pursuing non-violent approaches to conflict prevention?
- Why is consideration of Just Peace missing in Defence deliberations?

Such scrutiny will be the focus of the Conference, timely as a Federal Election looms.

CONFERENCE SPEAKERS

PROFESSOR JOHN LANGMORE AM



John Langmore is Professorial Fellow and Chair of the Board of the Initiative for Peacebuilding at the University of Melbourne. Member for Fraser in the House of Representatives for 12 years, he has been Divisional Director in the UN Secretariat in New York for five years, and Representative for the ILO to the UN for two. He has taught graduate subjects in international political economy, undertaken research on international economic strategy and conflict prevention and peacebuilding. He has written extensively.

PROFESSOR JOCELYN CHEY AM

Jocelyn Chey is Adjunct Professor at Western Sydney University and UTS and Visiting Professor at the University of Sydney. Her thirty-year career with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade included two postings in Beijing, and one as Consul General to Hong Kong and Macau. A Fellow of the Australian Institute of International Affairs, her current research fields include Australia-China and Australia-Hong Kong relations and Chinese humour. She was awarded the Australia-China Council Medal in 2008.



DR EMMA LESLIE AM

An Australian - Cambodian, Emma Leslie founded and directs the Centre for Peace and Conflict Studies, based in Siem Riep, Cambodia. Through peace talks, missions, mediation and assisting non-state actors in negotiations, she has been involved for a long time with conflict transformation in Asia. She developed the MA and Ph.D. programs in Applied Conflict Transformation Studies (ACTS). She teaches mediation to United Nations personnel annually at the Swedish government's Folke Bernadotte Academy.



DR SANDIE CORNISH

Sandie Cornish is Director of the Office for Justice Ecology and Peace of the Australian Catholic Bishops. Her doctorate in Practical Theology is from the Australian Catholic University, where she is sessional staff. She is well recognized for her research, writing, policy work and interpreting Catholic Social Teaching at local, national and regional levels. She led the Hong Kong-based international human rights agency The Center for the Progress of Peoples and is a member of the Vatican's Dicastery (Department) for the Promotion of Integral Human Development.
