Calling Australia home? Shifting public opinion on refugees

n March 2004, a brainstorm was held to develop strategies to engage the church and other communities about changing perceived attitudes to asylum seekers and refugees.

The participants proposed images, themes and slogans to better convey the hopes and hardships of refugees and asylum seekers and the aspirations they hold in common with the wider Australian community.

CWS's Refugee and Displaced Peoples program will increase funding this year for educational work to assist church members to face and question community anxieties and the political messages which have created harsher attitudes towards the vulnerable "outsider".

The brainstorm recommended RDP explore opportunities for training more speakers because passionate, well-informed communicators have most impact on audiences. The group also identified a series of eye-catching and thought-provoking poster images and themes and information areas to include in communication tools.

The massive loss of lives in Bam (Iran) has left deep scars on the local communities. People are trying to cope with the loss of family members and friends, homes and personal belongings and there is great trauma which requires urgent attention.

Action by Churches Together, the global alliance of churches and relief agencies, is providing counselling with staff of the Middle East Council of Churches. They are also working to provide prefabricated shelters and semi-permanent, earthquake resistant housing, space for vocational training of women and young people, and training for Iranian non-government organisations.
